
Repentance

2. to feel such sorrow for sin or fault as to be disposed to change one's life for the better; be penitent.








REPENTANCE INVOLVES COMING TO YOUR SENSES

REPENTANCE INVOLVES CONFESSION



- Real repentance doesn't stop at sorrow
- Sadness doesn't always lead to change (2nd Cor. 7:10)
- Repentance continues with confession and commitment
- The prodigal son made a decision that things would be different
