Conduct yourselves with wisdom toward outsiders, making the most of the opportunity.



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
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We must conduct ourselves with wisdom toward our brethren as well.

And take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.



For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.

Bombarding someone with Scripture after Scripture after Scripture doesn't win souls – while "the gospel is God's power unto salvation" unless we can lead someone to honestly examine what the word says - we haven't really accomplished anything worthwhile.



Don't interrupt while they're talking. Be patient – you'll have your chance to talk - be ready to contribute in a **positive way**.







~ Matthew 5:13a (NLT)




You are "salt" [5.13]-"light" [5.14] "let your light shine" - ;et them "see your good works" – "all for God's glory" [5.16] -You "maximize [your] ability to 'flavor' by "teaching the truth in love" [Ephesians 4.15].



Let your speech always be gracious, [courteous] seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer each person.

Remember –God has opened this door of opportunity. – Colossians 4.2 – You don't need to try to explain "how" God opened the door – just be thankful for it, and prayerfully make the most of it.



A "smorgasbord" buffet that offers a wide variety of foods to choose from can mean good food – however – a "smorgasbord" Bible Study is a horrible way to study God's Word.



You must respectfully control the study – and one way to do it is by telling them every time they want to go from one subject to another: Thank you for suggesting - that will make a great topic for a future study. I'm going to write that down so that I won't forget it.



You will accomplish so much more by staying on "topic."



When it becomes obvious that "we" (you and they) disagree – don't allow the disagreement to be between "you" and "them."



Take them to the Bible Passage that clearly addresses the topic you're discussing — ask them to read the scripture aloud – then ask them to explain the meaning in their own words. Let them talk while you listen.



The main reason you're asking them to read the text is to take the focus off of "you" against "them."



It can **never** appear as though it's our religion against their religion – primarily because it's not our religion – it's God's religion.



If this happens – try to quickly bring this discussion to an end - and attempt to reschedule another time to study. Once their ears are closed – it's unlikely that they will open back up you've lost them.



Now while Paul was waiting for them in Athens, his spirit was being provoked within him as he observed that the city was full of idols.

- Acts 17.16ff -




Then Paul stood up before the meeting of the Areopagus council and said, "Men of Athens, everything I see here tells me you are very religious.

It's **not** about **winning** a religious argument – it's about allowing the "gospel" – "God's power unto salvation" to be planted into their hearts [minds] [which] - **if** their heart is **receptive** – the seed that has been planted will bring **fruit**.
